

GEORGIA AUXILIARY Gets

Creative to Raise Awareness, Get Youth Involved in Scholarships & Contests

Less than one year after joining Auxiliary 4346 in Toccoa, Georgia, Li'el Cohen ascended to the office of President and started down the road of revitalization for a small Auxiliary with few active members. The Auxiliary reached its 70th year since institution this year.

"Our Auxiliary needed to regroup and start growing (because) we were a little stagnant, and we needed more things we could do as a group," explained Cohen, who began brainstorming a fundraiser in 2023 that would also raise awareness about the Auxiliary's work with veterans within the community.

A longtime lover and collector of art, Cohen came up with the idea for "ArtFest," an art festival that would not only raise the funds and awareness the

Auxiliary needed, but would allow for local students to display their patriotic art beside professional and semi-professional artists selling their original works, in addition to art raffles and face painting. Through Auxiliary and Post connections, they were able to bring in a local food truck and have a coffee shop there to sell drinks to be enjoyed with snacks from the Auxiliary bake sale table.

Once they were set with inviting members, they looked for ways to involve aspects from a number of Auxiliary Programs.

Junior Vice-President Davelyn Black had the idea to incorporate art scholarships and youth contests into the event. This was particularly successful at an elementary school level, and they received 80 Illustrating America entries! These were displayed throughout the hall, which brought in many families so proud parents could see the works of their talented children and their peers hanging over the stage.

"It was a brilliant idea," said Cohen. "It brought in people who ordinarily wouldn't have come (and) they had a great day!"

Additionally, members displayed "Buddy"® Poppies on the tables of each vendor (23 signed up; the maximum allowable for the space) and American Flags were handed out to each child in attendance, tying the "Buddy"® Poppy & VFW National Home and Americanism Programs into the event.

"But the biggest thing it really did is... building community," said Cohen. "If you are not connected with the community you are in you are not going to be able to do very much. We are blessed with huge military support (it's a military town) and... people are so giving and so anxious to help." Cohen noted that she and the Auxiliary connected with local business, schools and the town's chamber of commerce which helped with cross-promotion, and advertised the event mostly on social media, though they also had flyers and word-of-mouth.

Turnout was good, with at least 60 community members coming before the weather put a damper on attendance in the afternoon. "Everybody was pleased," said Cohen, who is confident they can make it "Even bigger" for the second-annual event. One thing the Auxiliary will do differently? The patriotic art raffle.

Next year, a few weeks before the ArtFest, the Auxiliary plans to participate in the town's Christmas tree decorating contest, at which the public will view each and vote on their favorite, with the winner taking home \$500. The Auxiliary will be asking artists to donate one handmade patriotic ornament for the tree, which members will then place along with red, white and blue lights and ribbon. Having their tree in the competition will raise more awareness about the Auxiliary and the best part is that the ornaments will then be the ArtFest raffle prizes!



The incorporation of multiple Programs and the community connections make the ArtFest an ideal type of event for Auxiliaries struggling to get the word out about what the Auxiliary does and the scholarships, contests and volunteer opportunities offered. If your Auxiliary is interested in an Auxiliary SWAP-style exchange of ideas and would like more information about how Auxiliary 4346 made their firstannual ArtFest work, Cohen says to please feel free to reach out to her; she's "happy to share." 🙀 NP

GONAL COUISVILLE, KENTUCKY

DERBY CITY

Members will head to bourbon country for the VFW Auxiliary's 111th National Convention, uniting in a city as famous for horse races, striking derby day hats and mint juleps as it is for its history, culture and people, including native son "The Greatest" heavyweight boxer Muhammad Ali.

We're meeting in Louisville, Kentucky along the Ohio River, a town that can be described as either one of the northernmost Southern cities or southernmost Northern cities. To us Northerners, it is "Louie-ville," while locals would probably call "Lou-vul" home.



HISTORY

However *you* say it, Louisville, established nearly two and a half centuries ago, was named in honor of King Louis XVI of France; at the time, his soldiers were aiding Americans in the Revolutionary War. Louisville's founding father was George Rogers Clark, an American military officer and surveyor from Virginia, in 1778. ¹

Nineteenth century Louisville was a major shipping port that employed enslaved African-Americans, some of whom found a point of escape in neighboring free state Indiana. It was also during this era that steamboats, for travel and trade, ruled the Ohio River. ²


Today's Louisville blends old and new architecture and comprises many noteworthy neighborhoods, a few of which we'll highlight for their visitor appeal. Our members will stay in

for Convention, a walkable district that, according to Go To Louisville, the city's tourism and marketing organization, offers something for everyone.

"Whether you're interested in exploring the city's rich history and architecture, experiencing the local culture and cuisine, diving into a distillery experience or

enjoying outdoor activities along the Ohio

River, there's no shortage of things to see and do. From the Muhammad Ali Center and the Evan Williams

Bourbon Experience to the Louisville Slugger Museum

& Factory and Waterfront Park, the area is home to a range of cultural attractions that are sure to please.

Downtown Louisville is a must-do experience that offers a unique blend of entertainment, education and fun."

Also Downtown is the Kentucky Center for African-American Heritage.

Whiskey Row located downtown, is an area that "is re-inhabiting the original footprint that once served as home to the bourbon industry from the mid-to-late 1800s, while Museum Row is home to several notable museums all within a few blocks of each other.

Lining downtown Louisville's Main Street are some of the oldest buildings in the city, built between the 1850s and early 1900s.

The Revivalist and Chicago School-style buildings with cast-iron facades are the largest collection, second only to SoHo in New York City. Named one of the best Main Streets in America, this downtown street is once again a thriving bourbon and culinary district and home to some of the city's most iconic attractions."


The **Old Louisville** neighborhood is the largest historic preservation district solely featuring Victorian homes and buildings in the United States; it is also the third-largest district containing such architectural distinctions in the United States. Many modern skyscrapers are located downtown, as well as older preserved structures, such as the Southern National Bank building.¹


Other neighborhoods include **The Highlands**, Louisville's "original restaurant row," **Shelby Park & Smoketown** for art and culture and Wyandotte for the famous **Churchill Downs**, home to the horse race in May also known as the most exciting two minutes in sports, the Kentucky Derby.

FOOD

For those who love local eats, you can't leave Louisville without indulging in a Hot Brown, a decadent open-faced sandwich of Texas toast, sliced turkey, crisp bacon and tomatoes nestled under a rich, piping hot Mornay (cheese) sauce. The dish was created at the Brown Hotel in Louisville in 1926.

Another legendary regional food comes from none other than Col. Harland Sanders, who began his business of selling his secret-recipe fried chicken from a roadside restaurant during the Great Depression. Today the chain known globally

For the VFW National Home and the VFW Auxiliary, this coming Program Year will be a year to remember because it marks a century for this safe, nurturing environment for our nation's veterans and their families and just as many decades of our organization supporting the Home's wonderful work.

Members will join incoming VFW Auxiliary National President Brenda Bryant at the National Home this September for the 2024 Celebrating America's Freedom Event at a special community that has helped countless children and families in immeasurable ways. Festivities include a parade of all Auxiliary Departments led by Bryant and incoming VFW National Commander-in-Chief Al Lipphardt, lunch and a tour of the campus during which National Ambassadors will share the history of the National Home.

CAFE is scheduled for September 7. Registration is \$40 per person and includes lunch and transportation to the Home (\$20 for lunch only). The VFW Auxiliary has been involved in the National Home in many ways since the very beginning, as vocal supporters, fundraisers and volunteers. The National Home became the Auxiliary's first continuing Program almost 100 years ago, as members recognized early on the need for such an endeavor.

In the wake of World War I, the VFW was adamant that no service member's child should grow up in an orphanage or institution, and the Auxiliary wholeheartedly agreed. The National Home was born of this desire to provide homes for these children - real homes, with comfortable bedrooms, inviting living rooms, plenty of food and happy holiday

celebrations, in an idyllic community with a pond for fishing, hills for sledding and beautiful shady

> trees, with its own hospital, nursery, playgrounds, fire department and

room to raise a few farm animals.

The 42 single-family home community in Eaton Rapids, Michigan now welcomes whole families; each can live on campus for up to four years, during which time they have access to a number of services including child care, mental health care, job

training and more.

Delivering the promise to our veterans, service members and their families.

The VFW has played an instrumental role in nearly every piece of veterans' legislation passed since the beginning of the 20th century. Everything the VFW does on Capitol Hill is with the VFW's Priority Goals and veterans' well-being in mind. With the strength of the more than 1.5 million members of the VFW and its Auxiliary, our voice on Capitol Hill cannot be ignored.

BUDGET

VFW AUXILIARY MAGAZINE

To fully fund programs for veterans, service members, and their families, Congress must:

- Reform the dysfunctional federal budget process.
- Authorize VA to receive reimbursements from TRICARE and Medicare.
- Never reduce one veteran's benefits to pay for another.

EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT, AND TRANSITION ASSISTANCE

To ensure veterans succeed after leaving military service, Congress, VA, DOD, and DOL must:

- Improve education benefits through increased online student housing allowances, child care stipends, parity for Guard and Reserve members, and elimination of delimiting dates.
- Enhance outreach and counseling to veterans eligible for the Veteran Readiness and Employment program.
- Ensure parity of VA and DOD education programs with other federal programs.
- Expand small business, hiring preference, tax incentives and entrepreneurship resources for veterans and military spouses.

- Increase funding for HUD-VASH vouchers, grant and per diem payments, and pilot programs to combat veteran homelessness.
- Conduct oversight of VA's Transition Assistance Program to ensure compliance with the law, and require the inclusion of accredited claims representatives.
- Eliminate red tape preventing effective use of education and employment benefits.
- Provide housing relief for surviving spouses.

DISABILITY ASSISTANCE AND MEMORIAL AFFAIRS

To ensure veterans and their survivors have timely access to earned benefits, Congress and VA must:

- Crack down on unaccredited claims consultants known as Claim Sharks.
- Study all toxic and environmental exposures and implement programs to ensure health care and benefits are provided to all exposed service members and veterans.
- Properly oversee and update the modernized appeals process and digital claims processing.
- Increase Dependency and Indemnity Compensation benefits for survivors.
- Improve the accuracy of disability compensation claims related to military sexual trauma.
- Increase burial allowances to account for inflation.
- Ensure that earned VA benefits are never offset by the use of other federal benefits.

HEALTH CARE

To ensure service members and veterans receive timely access to high-quality health care without increasing cost shares, Congress, VA, and DOD must:

- Eliminate service member and veteran suicide by addressing both clinical and non-clinical needs.
- Strengthen care and research for mental health and traumatic brain injuries.
- Improve oversight of Vet Centers to ensure adequate staffing, resources and funding.
- Enhance programs and services for women and underserved veterans.
- Eliminate copayment requirements for preventive health care and medications.
- Research the efficacy of medical cannabis and other alternative therapies.

- Preserve the integrity of TRICARE.
- Properly implement VA and DOD health IT systems.
- Expand nursing home eligibility and long-term care options.
- Enhance services for veterans outside of the United States.

MILITARY QUALITY OF LIFE

To maintain a quality, comprehensive benefits and retirement package that is the backbone for preserving the all-volunteer force, Congress and DOD must:

- End the military retirement pay and VA disability compensation offset.
- Protect and improve on-base quality of life and support programs.
- Eliminate sexual assault and harassment from the military.
- Increase military base pay comparability with private sector wages.
- Ensure that military housing is safe and free of toxic substances.
- Eliminate food insecurity in the military.
- Ensure equity of benefits for Reserve Component service members.

NATIONAL SECURITY, FOREIGN AFFAIRS, AND POW/MIA

To fully support the all-volunteer force, protect our nation's citizens and defend American interests around the world, Congress and DOD must:

- Ensure DPAA is fully funded to perform its personnel recovery mission.
- Expand partnerships with host nations and private/public organizations to achieve the fullest possible accounting of U.S. military personnel missing from all wars.
- Deter threats to our national security by supporting our allies in Ukraine, Israel, Korea and Taiwan.
- Ensure all service members who served in harm's way, to include foreign nationals, receive the recognition, care and benefits they have earned.
- Provide recognition and support for Afghan and Iraqi translators and allies.
- Award the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal for operations in Eastern Europe.

MALTA, our membership database, was created for EVERY MEMBER to use. MALTA stands for Membership Auxiliary Leadership Technology Access. It is an online database in which members can pay their dues, change their addresses, convert to a Life Membership, find Auxiliary report forms, watch training videos, access Member Resources by Program, make a gift and much more!

From the initial announcement regarding MALTA in 2017: MALTA is a system designed with YOU in mind the whole time. Not only does National Headquarters want to be more efficient but we also want to engage with every member through MALTA.

Creating a login is easy! All you need is your member ID, your Auxiliary number and ZIP code.

Visit https://malta.vfwauxiliary.org/Account/NewLogin to enter your information. You can do this on a desktop computer, smart phone or tablet. You could also go to vfwauxiliary.org and look for "MALTA Member Login." From either web address, follow the instructions on-screen to get started.

Do note that although every member may use MALTA, lapsed members will be directed to pay their dues in MALTA and will regain full access once they become a member in good standing again. Also note that some areas of and actions within MALTA are restricted and only accessible to certain Officers, like Treasurers, but every member is entitled to everything else that MALTA has to offer.

VFW AUXILIARY HOSPITAL olunteer SERVICE PINS

Pins bearing the VFW Auxiliary emblem and designating the number of hours a volunteer has devoted to hospital work will be awarded to members in good standing who have volunteered a minimum of 150 hours under Auxiliary sponsorship

in any hospital. Only the pin or bar indicating the largest number of hours accumulated should be worn.

Applications for service pins – which acknowledge as many as 10,000 hours – are available online in MALTA Member Resources, Hospital.

Pins between 6,000 and 9,000 hours are triangular with an additional pearl for each 1,000 earned. A bar guard signifying 10,000 hours may be attached to this pin, and bar guards are available for each additional 1,000 hours.



SPONSORED HOSPITAL VOLUNTEER PIN

The sponsored hospital volunteer/student volunteer who volunteers a minimum of 100 hours under the VFW Auxiliary sponsorship in any VA or non-VA facility is eligible to receive this pin from VFW Auxiliary National Headquarters. This award is for non-members and only one pin is awarded during volunteer's lifetime.



HOSPITAL RECRUITING CHARM

A charm from VFW Auxiliary National Headquarters will be awarded to each member recruiting one or more volunteers between July 1 and May 31. These charms are available for both VFW Auxiliary members and sponsored hospital volunteer/student volunteers.

Note: Please apply for pins when accumulated hours are earned by volunteer. Applications for hospital volunteer service pins are available in MALTA Member Resources. Applications are to be prepared by the local VFW Auxiliary Hospital Chairman. All pins are available from VFW Auxiliary National Headquarters at no cost to the Department, Auxiliary, member or non-member volunteer. THINK—Before

Electing Delegates and Alternates for your 2023 District, Department and National Conventions, those present at the March, April and May Auxiliary meetings need to consider the following:

- Those members who have stated their interest in attending the upcoming District, Department and National Conventions;
- Those members who have attended these Convention meetings in the recent past;
- Those members who are District and/or Department Officers and/or Chairmen;
- Those members who are the spouses of VFW Officers who will represent the VFW Post at these same Conventions;
- In short, talk with your members and ask them if they are interested in representing the Auxiliary at District, Department or National Conventions.

EXAMPLES:

- Your Auxiliary Treasurer is the Department Legislative Chairman, so yes, they would likely attend both the District and the Department Conventions and should be considered to be elected as a Delegate or Alternate to the Convention meetings.
- You know that your Post Commander will be the only member attending the District and Department Conventions; his wife, though she has not attended meetings regularly, has traveled with him

around the District and Department and therefore would be present at the Conventions so the Auxiliary would have at least one (1) Representative present.

Note that Delegates and Alternates to Districts shall be elected at a regular meeting of the Auxiliary held not less than 30 days prior to the District Convention at which District Officers are to be elected.

Also, the Auxiliary needs to be familiar with the number of Delegates and Alternates to which it is entitled for District (Section 302-1 Delegate and 1 Alternate for each fifteen (15) members in good standing or portion thereof at the time of election); Department (Section 303-1 Delegate and 1 Alternate for each thirty (30) members in good standing or portion thereof at the time of election) and National (Section 304-1 Delegate and 1 Alternate for each fifty (50) members in good standing or portion thereof at the time of election).

Following the elections of these respective Delegates and Alternates, it is the responsibility of the Auxiliary Secretary to see that the Representatives chosen by the Auxiliary reach their District and Department Secretary prior to those Conventions. The Auxiliary Secretary must input the Delegates and Alternates to National Convention to National Convention in MALTA by no later than May 31 or mail, fax or email to info@vfwauxiliary.org the Delegates' and Alternates' names and membership ID numbers to the National Secretary.

The Auxiliary Secretary is responsible for reporting the Auxiliary's Delegates and Alternates to the District Secretary (District Convention) and to the Department Secretary (Department Convention) by the respective deadlines and National Convention (National Secretary) or input the Delegates and Alternates into MALTA. Auxiliary Secretaries are encouraged to print out the list of Delegates and Alternates to verify that those entered were posted. Once your Secretary enters you as a National Delegate or National Alternate, this will appear in your MALTA profile. Be sure to verify this by May 31 to ensure you have time if any issues need to be corrected.

HISTORY

GENERATIONS OF MEN IN THE AUXILIARY

At the 2015 National Convention, a change to the Bylaws would allow thousands of men who grew up in the Auxiliary to become Auxiliary members. Now one in every five members of our organization is male.

Violet Tharp, Department of Montana, became a member of Auxiliary 4099

in the spring of 1971. At this Auxiliary and Post, she would find friends and "adopted" grandparents for her children. She would serve as musician, Auxiliary President (1979-1981), District President and more, all while raising her children.

Once membership opened up to men, Violet purchased her son Tim his Life Membership.

"I purchased a Life Membership for

Tim in the hopes the Programs would have more coverage in the schools where he worked," Violet said. "To see him active locally has been very rewarding. He has such great organizational skills and can multitask to the point your head spins. He follows the Ritual and does not take shortcuts. His respect and courtesy to the members is only enhanced with his relationship with the Post, the community, and students. He not only makes me proud, but also his "additional moms and grandmas."

Tim said the reason he loves the Auxiliary is because of service.

"It is all about service and helping others," he said. "I love the beginning and ending parts of our Ritual where we remind ourselves that our only purpose as an Auxiliary is to serve veterans and their families. Too often, in many organizations, we get hung up with personal beefs, petty bickering, egos and power trips. There is no place for that in our organization as we are here to serve those who risked everything to protect the lifestyle and freedoms we enjoy as Americans."

Everett and Cameron Erwin are both members at Auxiliary 10334 in Waltham, Massachusetts. Everett's wife, Kelly, is a longtime member and Department "Buddy"® Poppy Chairman.

"Shortly after allowing men to join, I saw that I was eligible through my grandfather Edgar Page and his service in World War II," Everett said. His son Cameron would later join the Auxiliary when he turned 17 under the eligibility of his maternal grandfather.

"I am all for progress and moving forward socially," Everett added. "Not being a veteran myself, but I like being able to give back to those who served. I do get frustrated by some members who do not accept men in the Auxiliary. But overall, I am happy with it."

Everett said that he is not as active at his local Auxiliary due to most events being during his work hours but is active at the District and State level. He is the Department Musician and unofficially, the Department technology guru.

Cameron has volunteered for District and State events with his parents. "I recently did a School of Instruction for District 18 where I taught them how to use their cameras to make a video and upload it to YouTube. It was a good experience."

Everett said that he is glad Cameron has joined the Auxiliary. "I tried not to pressure him but the VFW and Auxiliary are very much a family affair... I think Cam has learned a lot about service to others through his time in Boy Scouts, and the Auxiliary is a way for him to continue that as an adult. He gets to see his mother serve as a Department Chairman (current Department Senior Vice-President) and witness her leadership."
