VETERAN The Cunningham Family: Part I

ALL IN THE FAMILY HUSBAND AND WIFE AUXILIARY MEMBERS LEARNED OF THEIR FATHERS' SERVICE IN VARIED WAYS

Many influences can build a family. For the Cunningham family, there is almost a regiment full of veterans who have helped shape their lives.

Carrie Cunningham, Auxiliary 358 member in Ballston Spa, New York, remembers hearing her father tell stories of helping kids find food in the Philippines. Her husband Alan never knew his biological father; he had to request his father's military records. Alan was raised by two stepfathers who both served. The first died when Alan was 9; the second he worked side-by-side with at a service station during his high school years.

"Both of these men taught me ethics that I use every day," Alan said about his stepfathers. "My biological father was a mystery."

From going through the requested military records, Alan learned that in 1942 his biological father, Bernard "Bernie" Swartz, enlisted in the U.S. Marines with his brother Charles "Bud" Swartz without their parents' knowledge. Bernie was 16 and his brother forged his birth certificate so they could join at the same time. The military caught up with Bernie and the forged date only after his mother found out they had enlisted. Bernie was stationed in the States until he turned 17, then shipped out and participated in the invasion of Gaum where he served until the end of the war.

"I kind of resented him, but looking into his past military history, I understand how a 16-year-old who went into the service and saw combat at 17 could move on to another life," Alan said. "He just wasn't ready to settle down."

Alan is an ordained minister, Chaplain for VFW Auxiliary 358, Chaplain for the Sons of the American Legion Post 234 and Chaplain for Union Fire Co. #2, all in Ballston Spa. He believes knowing his father's military background has made him a more understanding person. While there are still pieces of father's life that are mysteries, what he has learned has changed his perception of who the man was.

"I'm going to guess he was adventurous, looking to get away from the farm and maybe a dreamer. I feel I follow some of these traits - like father, like son," Alan said.

"Whether he stayed or moved on, I have to thank him, for I am here, the son of a Marine. Semper Fi."

Alan inspired Carrie to request the military records of her father, Willard Hayes, and learn more about his time as a gunner in a B-17.

"Dad didn't talk about combat and what it was like being a belly gunner on a bomber," Carrie said. "He only talked about the kids he could help. I heard the stories over and over; I never tired of listening to him."

- We've included the Auxiliary Locator. This is important because most applicants have no Auxiliary connection and don't realize how difficult it is to help connect them with a participating Auxiliary close to or on the day of the deadline.
- We're featuring a National first-place winner's artwork on the 3-Dimensional side of the brochure.
- It includes a statement about what this contest is and why we offer it.

2025 D-YEAR CANCUN, MEXICO

Attendees to the 2025 National Mid-Year Conference were greeted by the smiles and hellos of National Line Officers, including National President Brenda Bryant, and Val Cooper from Veterans Travel Service (VTS) when they arrived at the Royalton Hideaway in Cancun, Mexico, on February 1, 2025. Before official business got underway, members had time to explore the resort's many restaurants, pools, beaches and bars, check out the spa and hydrotherapy options, visit the small on-site

casino, shop for souvenirs and enjoy beautiful weather while catching up with good friends from around the country.

Bryant opened the National Council of Administration meeting on Sunday, Feb. 2 to a packed room of around 350 members, including National District Council Members, National Officers, National Ambassadors, Department Presidents and more. Guests included VFW National

Commander-in-Chief Al Lipphardt, VFW Adjutant General Dan West, VFW Quartermaster General Marc Garduno, Past Commander-in-Chief and VFW Foundation Executive Director Hal Roesch, VFW National Home Director Mike Wilson and Chicagobased investment vendor Joe Taiber (who paid his own way to attend). Each of them addressed the membership, highlights of which were Lipphardt's statement, "You've

been supporting us as if we are one organization because we are one organization," West's "Thank you for being the patriots this country needs; thank you for being the patriots our organization needs" and Garduno's reminder that the VFW and Auxiliary "is one team," referring to the Auxiliary as a "force multiplier."

The National Council discussed official business, including whether to start charging members credit card

> fees (the consensus was no, the organization should not do this, as the credit card payment option is intended as a service to members) and how to address rising air fares and ever-increasing postage. It was requested by National leadership

that those hoping to win awards at National Convention this year save some room in their suitcases to bring them home, cutting down on shipping. Reports were given by a number of committees

and alarm was raised about the skyrocketing number of disciplinary actions reaching the National level, many of which stem from issues that could have been solved through mediation if promptly and adequately addressed at a lower level. Toward the end, National Secretary-Treasurer Ann Panteleakos announced that fundraising for the Janice Criswell Department of Kansas Scholarship (for the Young American Creative Patriotic Art Contest) was complete, and starting in the 2026-2027 Program Year there will be \$4,000 awarded on a National level to a deserving student winner in her name.

It takes a one-time gift of \$100,000 to create a named scholarship at this level.

After the meeting's close, 2025-2026 National Guard candidates from the Eastern Conference were invited to address the membership. They are Lee Berrier of Massachusetts, Cynthia Davis of Maryland, Stephen Doherty of Rhode Island and Kathie Fleischauer of Connecticut. (Their brochures are available on the VFW Auxiliary <u>website</u>.) National Ambassadors also spoke, sharing the successes of the year thus far with excitement and pride.

"Keep moving forward," said Veterans & Family Support Ambassador Evan Smiley, noting that we are all "committed to the same mission – it's good!"

When asked "Who's in the lead?" for membership percentages, National Membership Ambassador Linda Roloff quipped, "The veterans!" earning chuckles and applause.



In addition to the Council of Administration Meeting, two official receptions were held; one on the beach to welcome attendees and one indoors to say goodbye. Plus Bryant held a fun and funny team-building get-together with her Department Presidents which started with brainteaser games and ended with Presidents from across the country cheerfully sharing some of the wonderful work going on in their states. In South Dakota, members have been handmaking baby blankets to be gifted along with their Operation Bottom Cover (Bryant's special project for the year) diaper donations, while Vermont members gave diapers to National Guard members' families who were "so excited" to receive them.

"It's just amazing what you guys are doing," said Bryant, visibly moved. As of the mid-point, "Our members are shining; they are doing things for our veterans that are just outstanding."

"I feel like I'm ready to start, now that I know what I'm doing!" half-joked Massachusetts President Kelly Durkee-Erwin.

During a vendor fair one evening, members milled about, examining beautiful, beaded bags, hand-carved flamenco dancers, glow-in-the-dark sugar skulls, summery clothing and pottery painted in the colors most associated with Mexican art – vibrant pinks, peacock blues and a bright yellow-orange. Among those "window-shopping" were Irma Soliz and Gerald

Spradlin, Texas' Department President and Conductor. They, and their state's delegation, saw the Mid-Year Conference as a wonderful time to connect and learn.

That's why the I-factor is so detrimental."

free days as their vacation and made the most of their time by having fun in the sun while bonding with fellow members. It was a wonderful way to build camaraderie and relax together in the middle of a year of tireless work for our veterans, youth and communities.

Those in attendance had a few words of wisdom for the overall membership, too.

"The best part of the VFW Auxiliary is that we are all family," said Sharonda Lewis, Department of California President. "You'll never regret choosing kindness," noted National Chief of Staff Betty Arnold.

"Don't just make a difference, BE the difference," Commander Lipphardt advised. With a sly smile, he added, "And some of you are really different!" ***** NP


VFW Day of Service kicks off Saturday, May 3, 2025, and you can participate ALL month!

WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO RUN FOR NATIONAL GUARD?



The Manchester, New Hampshire high school student moved to the United States from Vietnam with his parents and brother 12 years ago, seeking freedom, opportunity and an escape from communism. He did not know English or much about American culture, but as he wrote in his speech, "The journey we've taken from a country where our voices were stifled to one where we are empowered to speak, vote and participate is living proof that America still upholds the ideals set forth by its founders. America's core values of democracy, freedom and opportunity remain true even if the country has evolved significantly since its founding. Based on my family's experience, I can state with confidence that America still embodies the ideals of our founding fathers: a nation where everyone has the opportunity to follow their ambitions within a system that protects their rights, regardless of background."

He was awarded a \$35,000 scholarship.



HISTORY GUNFIRE, THE RED SCARE AND THE BIRTH OF A NEW HOLIDAY

From May 1 to May 4, 1886, protests, strikes and demonstrations advocating for the eight-hour workday took over the city of Chicago, forming a pivotal moment in the history of labor rights. Tragically, these events climaxed speak to the assembled VFW and Auxiliary members. They were there protesting the Communist May Day Celebration that was happening at the same time. In attendance was U.S. Congressman Hamilton Fish of New

when a bomb was detonated in Haymarket Square; this would become known as the Haymarket Affair. From then on in America, this part of the calendar would become a symbolic time to address workers' rights. As our history has shown, symbols like these can be used in a lot of diverse ways.

After the revolution in Russia in 1917 when the first Red Scare hit America's shores, the domestic fight for labor rights would get swept up in the anticommunism wave. The longobserved holiday of May Day, which has also become known as International Workers Day since the Haymarket Affair, was now being associated with



York, who had built his career on anticommunist policies. Before she went on stage, Fish saw that Hanken was cold and offered her his coat. She accepted and he draped it over her shoulders.

Suddenly, gunshots rang out. Three bullets flew into the crowd on stage. People began to scatter; a would-be assassin had taken aim at Fish as well as the other speakers. As the commotion began to subside, Hanken looked down. While nobody had been injured, Hanken saw three bullet holes in the sleeve of the coat she had just put on. The shooter was never apprehended.

Despite how close she had been to violence, Hanken was not deterred. The following May, the VFW and the Auxiliary let their voices be heard as they marched in the Boston Common.

communism. This is when the VFW and VFW Auxiliary decided to take the day back.

It was a chilly day in New York City on May 1, 1923. VFW Auxiliary member Bessie Hanken of Boston (and future Auxiliary National President) was preparing to Hanken submitted her application for the event that was now to be called Loyalty Day. Communist protesters had earlier petitioned to march on Boston Commons that day, so when both groups arrived more violence broke out. Auxiliary members' white uniforms were ripped at. This did not stop Hanken and her Auxiliary, they returned every year to celebrate on May 1. This continued as Hanken was elected National President in 1928 and then in 1929. In Boston in 1931, Hanken was again joined on stage by Congressman Fish to speak about Loyalty Day to the large assembly of VFW and Auxiliary members in attendance, as well as the more than 250 police officers on guard.

By then Loyalty Day was being celebrated across the United States with parades, rallies and speeches reaffirming belief in democracy. Sometimes these events were called Americanism Day, but the goals were the same. In 1958, after years of legislative lobbying led by the Auxiliary and the VFW, Congress officially designated May 1 as Loyalty Day. The creation of this holiday was the direct result of the work done by a brave Past National President and all the members of the Auxiliary and VFW.

LOYALTY THROUGH THE YEARS

Though there is a lot of competition for association with May 1, Loyalty Day has carved out its own lasting history with the day. On the day in 1930, 10,000 VFW members staged a rally at New York's Union Square to promote patriotism. From 1937 to 1938, Loyalty Day was seen as an important part of the Auxiliary's battle against Nazism and fascism.

After being declared a legal holiday, in 1959 President Dwight Eisenhower issued a proclamation on Loyalty Day. Since then, it has become a tradition for every president, no matter party affiliation, to issue a similar proclamation for this sometimes-overlooked holiday. In his 2024 proclamation on Loyalty Day, President Joe Biden said, "We all came from somewhere, but we are all American — loyal not to a person or a place but to an idea: We are all created equal and deserve to be treated equally throughout our lives. This idea is our nation's North Star. While we have never fully lived up to it, we have never stopped pursuing it. This Loyalty Day, we promise to always keep fighting for a more perfect union."

LOYALTY AND THE AUXILIARY

For the Auxiliary, Loyalty Day remained its own Program for a while before falling under Americanism in in the late 1960s.. VFW Posts and Auxiliaries created Loyalty Day pageants where a Loyalty Day Queen would be selected and sometimes scholarships were awarded.

Today, some Auxiliaries struggle with attendance to events like Loyalty Day parades. However, the Auxiliary stance is that it does not take a large group to honor this observance, and can be done one person at a time, with a simple recitation that begins "I pledge allegiance, to the Flag..." \bigstar KB
